What is the role of a Parish Councillor?

To appreciate what is involved in being a Parish Councillor you need to know what a Parish Council is, and what it can and cannot do. The Parish Council is nothing to do with the Church or the Diocese; nor is it a voluntary and community sector body; it is the local authority closest to the Electorate.

Each councillor has their own reasons for running but the role offers the chance to make a huge difference to the quality of life for people in your local area.

A Parish Council can also provide services for local people, including recreation grounds and play areas, allotments and bus shelters. The Parish Council has one particular asset that is extremely valuable — it has the ability to set a Precept (sum of money), which is collected from all residents through the Council Tax system. With the right to levy a form of taxation

Training is available and strongly promoted to members and officers, and support will be found from colleagues, the Clerk to the Council, as well as from external training providers. All Councillors retire after a four-year term but can stand again as many times as they wish; casual vacancies may well arise in the intervening period. It is a useful way of seeing if you like being a local Councillor to take a seat for a short period before the next full elections (next date for these is Thursday May 4th 2023).

If you want to do more for your community and you want to spend your time productively, and if you can think, listen and act locally — Become a Parish Councillor!

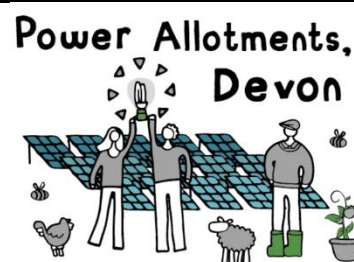

Power Allotments – renewable energy for community and wildlife benefit

Given climate change, the huge hike in energy prices, and a certain Mr Putin's stranglehold on energy resources, there's surely never been a more important time to be able to produce clean, green, renewable energy. If that energy independence could also provide income for local communities, while making things better for our struggling wildlife, we'd leap at the chance, wouldn't we?

Such are the ambitions of Power Allotments – a scheme recently launched and supported by Devon County Council, Regen and Devon Energy – a Community Interest Company. Local communities are invited to identify sites which may be suitable for an energy project: land around five acres, perhaps land tucked away behind hedgerows, next to a sewage farm, electricity substation or alongside a main road;



an area facing south-ish (south-east or south-west would do): somewhere to ground-mount solar panels. If there's room to also install a pond, or orchard, or beehives, too, then so much the better.

On the webpage, the Power Allotments Handbook gives details on the process and the Power Allotments mapping tool shows which areas could be included – and those excluded because they are either urban or 'high value agricultural land' or too far from the electricity grid. Sites identified and put forward by communities will be assessed and those with the most potential considered for further study. Help will be given to get the very best of the projects up and running.

Devon Electric Vehicle Charging Strategy

Devon County Council declared a climate emergency in 2019 and helped to publish the Devon Carbon Plan which sets out what needs to be done for the region to meet the climate emergency challenge. The decarbonisation of transport in Devon is a crucial part of this response as the sector represents a large proportion of Devon's emissions.

The transition to zero emission vehicles, as well as a shift to public transport and active travel, are vital to achieving the Devon goal of 50% emission reduction by 2030 and Net Zero by 2050. Nevertheless, many Devon residents rely on cars and vans, and local authorities have a role to play in enabling and accelerating the uptake of electric vehicles (EVs).

The Strategy

The Devon Electric Vehicle Charging Strategy aims to help all residents and visitors overcome barriers to EV adoption and increase access to suitable infrastructure. A key barrier to the uptake of EVs is the availability of suitable charging infrastructure. The EV strategy provides a summary of EVs in Devon, assesses the policy context, forecasts EV uptake and chargepoint demand to 2030 and sets out recommendations for how Devon County Council will intervene.

The strategy will form part of a suite of documents that will feed into the emerging Local Transport Plan and will be instrumental in leveraging funding from Government for new electric charging infrastructure.

Sustainable South Brent has some great new projects, helping to make life just that little bit better for South Brent residents and our environment.

Community Fridge Free-for-all: South Brent's very own Community Fridge is now officially open! The Fridge is open 24/7 to anyone to either reduce food waste by helping themselves to whatever's available, or to bring surplus food to add to the Fridge. You can find it at the entrance to the Old School Community Centre in the centre of the village.



As Nick Cape, Project Co-ordinator explains: "The Community Fridge is for *anyone* to use. Surplus and end-of-line food is collected by volunteers from supermarkets and local businesses who would otherwise be disposing of it. It's then put in the community fridge, for anyone to help themselves.

Also, if you have spare food yourself, (going on holiday or have extra vegetables in your garden/allotment?), you can put it in the fridge to share. Guidelines of what food is safe to share are posted by the fridge, and the fridge is checked daily by a dedicated team of volunteers".

The Community Fridge has been operating for a trial 'run-in' period for a little while, and we've already saved lots of food from being wasted, including many litres of milk, bread and all sorts of fruit and veg. Keep an eye on the fridge - you never know what might be available.

A huge thanks is due to all the volunteers and the support of the Co-op, South Hams District Council and Devon County Council who have made this project possible. The Co-op have also made us one of their Local Causes for 2022-23, for which we're really grateful - the Fridge would warmly welcome your support for this cause.

The Luces Garden, Hillside, South Brent

Many of you will fondly remember Noel and Geraldine Gould and the big part that they played in Brent. They have very kindly gifted to South Brent the long strip of land in Hillside, known as the Luces, (no-one knows why!) as a space to enjoy and share with wildlife. All are welcome to visit and enjoy the garden.



This was their very productive allotment, complete with chickens, which enabled the family, including 8 home-schooled children, to be largely self-sufficient. SSB are managing this site and we have a small informal group that meets there roughly every other Wednesday afternoon to try and keep a gentle check on overgrowth in the Luces, and to keep the space as safe and accessible as we can until firmer plans for future use are made. We’ve already harvested apples, figs and Japanese wineberries!

Brown Bin Collection

South Hams District Council has now cancelled the universal brown bin collection. This will be replaced by a new subscription service for an annual fee of £49. Collections will begin in March 2023

From 7th November 2022, it will be a legal requirement for all bird keepers to keep their birds housed and to follow stringent biosecurity measures to protect their flocks. This applies whether keepers have commercial flocks, or just a few birds in a backyard. Link to the housing order.

You can help protect your birds and prevent avian flu by maintaining good biosecurity on your premises, including:

BIRD FLU HAS BEEN DETECTED IN THIS AREA DON'T RISK SPREADING IT!

Keep to the footpath

Keep dogs on leads

Do not feed wild waterfowl

Do not pick up or touch dead or sick wild birds

Do not touch wild bird feathers or surfaces contaminated with wild bird droppings

If you keep poultry or other birds, wash your hands and clean and disinfect your footwear before tending to your birds

Please report dead wild waterfowl (swans, geese, or ducks) or other dead wild birds, such as gulls or birds of prey to Defra's GB helpline: 03459 335577

- housing or netting all poultry and captive birds
- minimising direct and indirect contact between poultry and captive birds and wild birds - including making sure that their feed and water is not accessible to wild birds.
- preventing access by poultry and captive birds to ponds and watercourses
- cleansing and disinfecting footwear and equipment before and after contact with poultry and captive birds (or changing into clean footwear before tending to your birds)
- regularly cleaning and disinfecting hard surfaces in areas where birds are kept
- reducing the movement of people, vehicles or equipment to and from areas where poultry and captive birds are kept, to minimise contamination, and using effective vermin control
- keeping fresh approved disinfectant at the right concentration for use at farm entrances and before entering poultry and captive bird housing or enclosures

The Food Standards Agency advice remains unchanged, that avian influenza poses a very low food safety risk for UK consumers. Properly cooked poultry and poultry products, including eggs, are safe to eat.

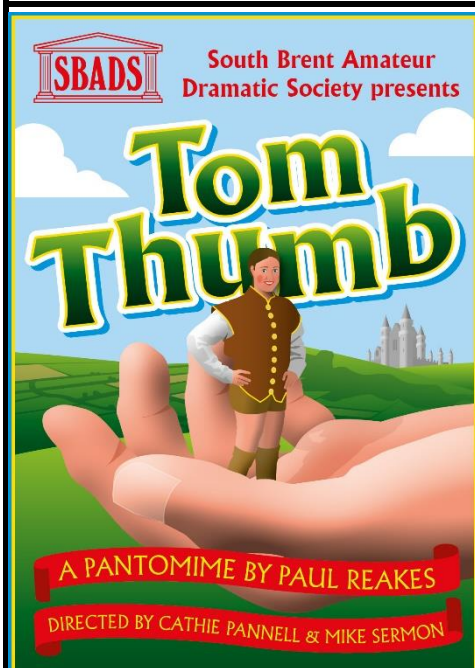
